

#### 2001 Census Profile: Glossary

- <sup>1.</sup> **Total Population**: usual resident population. Area measurements are based on the 2001 version of the OS Boundary-Line data set, and do not include inland water.
- <sup>2.</sup> **Age Structure**: of resident population. 'Age' is age as at last birthday. 'Average age' (or 'mean age') is calculated by dividing the sum of each person's age in whole years by the number of people. 'Median age', calculated using the underlying single year counts, is the middle value when all ages are arranged in order from youngest to oldest.
- <sup>3.</sup> Marital Status: 'Separated' category: Separated (but still legally married).
- <sup>4.</sup> **Religion**: Current religion. Please note that missing answers for the Religion variable were not imputed.
- <sup>5.</sup> Health and Provision of Unpaid Care:
- a.) Limiting long-term illness covers any long-term illness; health problem or disability which limits daily activities or work.
- b.) Working age population (in respect of LLTI data) is 16-64 inclusive for men and 16-59 inclusive for women.
- c.) General health is a self-assessment of a person's health over the 12 months prior to Census day.
- d.) Provision of unpaid care: looking after; giving help or support to family members; friends; neighbours or others because of long-term physical or mental ill-health or disability or problems relating to old age.
- <sup>6.</sup> Qualifications: The highest recorded level of qualification of people aged 16-74: -

Level 1: 1+'O' level passes, 1+CSE/GCSE any grades; NVQ level 1; Foundation GNVQ.

**Level 2**: 5+ 'O' level passes; 5+ CSEs (grade 1's); 5+GCSEs (grades A-C); School Certificate; 1+ 'A' levels/AS levels; NVQ level 2; Intermediate GNVQ.

Level 3: 2+ 'A' levels; 4+ AS levels; Higher School Certificate; NVQ level 3; Advanced GNVQ.

**Level 4/5**: First degree; Higher degree; NVQ levels 4 and 5; HNC; HND; Qualified Teacher Status; Qualified Medical Doctor; Qualified Dentist; Qualified Nurse; Midwife; Health Visitor.

- <sup>7.</sup> **Economic Status**: Full-time is defined as working 31 or more hours a week; part-time 30 hours or less a week.
- <sup>8.</sup> Industry: Coded to the UK Standard Industrial Classification of Economic Activities 1992 UK (SIC) 92 (modified version).
- <sup>9.</sup> Occupation Groups: Coded to the 2000 edition of the Standard Occupational Classification (SOC).
- <sup>10.</sup> **Means of Travel to Work**: The means of travel used for the longest part, by distance, of the usual journey to work of all people aged 16-74 in employment. For the purposes of the data, public transport is defined as underground, metro, light rail or tram, train, bus, minibus or coach.
- <sup>11.</sup> **Hours worked**: The average number of hours worked a week for the last four weeks before the Census. Full-time is defined as working 31 or more hours a week; part-time 30 hours or less a week.
- <sup>12.</sup> **Households and Household Composition**: The persons per room data (occupancy rating) provides a measure of under-occupancy and overcrowding. For example a value of -1 (i.e. over 1 person per room) implies that there is one room too few and that there is overcrowding in the household. The occupancy rating assumes that every household, including one person households, requires a minimum of two common rooms (excluding bathrooms).
- <sup>13.</sup> **Household Tenure and Amenities**: The 'Owner occupied' household tenure data includes; owned outright; owns with a mortgage or loan; and shared ownership (pays part rent and mortgage). The 'Housing Association / RSL (Registered Social Landlord)' category includes Housing Co-operatives and Charitable Trusts. The 'Other tenure' category includes an employer of a household member or relative or friend living rent free. Car/van data includes any company car or van if available for private use.
- <sup>14.</sup> **Accommodation Type and Occupancy**: Household spaces of accommodation type or reason for having no residents.

**NB:** Figures are subject to Random adjustment applied by the Office for National Statistics (ONS) to prevent the inadvertent disclosure of information about identifiable individuals. Small counts in all tables issued for England and Wales are adjusted. In addition there was swapping of records in the output database, and broad limitations are placed on details in tables produced for small populations.

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
